Healing Housing's mission is to shelter and love women in recovery.

Over the past few years, moving from a sober living focus to a holistic recovery model has helped us understand new ways to carry out this mission and address cracks in the system that keep women cycling in and out of recovery.

Thanks to a strong 2021 with increased revenue from grants, donor contributions, and our annual fundraiser, we were able to add vital services, resulting in greater retention and long-term sobriety rates among residents and graduates.

Services we added last year include a female-specific Intensive Outpatient Programming, vocational training from UpRise Nashville, and onsite mental health care with Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner (PNP), Rhonda Bartaine.

Each of these program components is foundational to the recovery, healing, and long-term success of the women we serve.

HEALING HOUSING is a 501(c)3 nonprofit residential recovery program serving women with limited resources throughout Middle Tennessee who are healing from addiction

We provide a stable home as well as extensive supportive services, rooted in both unconditional love and the power of community.

Women arrive from alcohol and drug addiction treatment or from jail, without money, jobs, or relationships left to support them.

We offer affordable and low cost program fees with 60% returned to residents through an automatic savings plan.

For the 6 to 12 months of her stay, we address a woman's mental and physical health, support her personal well-being and spiritual growth, and provide an immersive recovery experience.

THERAPY PROVIDED TO RESIDENTS

- Resident applications received: 115
- Resident admissions: 34
- In-house IOP graduates: 10
- Women assisted in paying off court fines: 16
- Alumnae group: 40

 - Graduates from Uprise Nashville vocational training program: 4

- Organizational revenue doubled from 2020.
- Extended pilot program of providing residents with 9 weeks of initial care at no cost to them.
- Expanded grant-writing to meet new program needs for 2021 & 2022—ending the year with a 5X increase in grants from 2020.
- Updated Healing Housing mission statement and branding.
- Switched to online annual fundraiser and raised \$140K, increasing sponsorships by 5X and total event revenue by 2X from previous year's fundraiser.
- Launched 3 critical additions to programming: in-house IOP, psychiatric nurse practitioner and vocational training and job placement.
- Enrolled staff in Licensed Alcohol and Drug Counselor (LADAC) certification.
- Instituted a \$500 stipend per resident to receive thorough dental exams and additional services via new community partner. Chrysalis Dental.
- Partnered with nonprofit Free for Life to hos online educational webinar on connections between addiction and human traffickina.
- Hosted well-attended Recovery Month inperson panel event on addiction and spirituality with guest community speakers.
- Implemented new donor fundraising platform.
- Increased monthly giving by 150%

PROGRAM UPDATES

COVID brought an increase in major depressive episodes, PTSD, and anxiety disorders among residents. To better meet their needs, Healing Housing received 12-month funding to engage a *PSYCHIATRIC MENTAL HEALTH NURSE PRACTITIONER (PNP)* to conduct evaluations, testing and medication management for women.

UPRISE NASHVILLE provides vocational training and job placements for at-risk students in one of 14 career tracks. To give residents the time and ability to focus on their education, HH pursued funding for a training stipend to help women build vital skills for their future.

FEMALE-SPECIFIC INTENSIVE OUTPATIENT CURRICULUM (IOP), developed by Dr. Stephanie Covington, was designed to meet the unique needs of women with addictive disorders. The 20-session program integrates theories of women's psychological development, trauma, and addiction and addresses relapse triggers such as relationships and domestic violence.



'21 CHALLENGES

Providing housing and services to women newly sober who come to us from treatment or jail with histories of trauma, poverty, and chronic unemployment, always takes a combination of an experienced staff, strong partners, committed supporters, and a lot of love, humor and prayer. Looking at last year in particular, the following challenges stood out for our Healing Housing team:

- 2021 and Covid brought women to our door who simply needed more support than in previous years. In general, women arrived more desperate while needing more services, more financial support, and more care.
- The generational nature of this disease has proved more relentless with an increasing number of residents' families in active addiction. With no support system to call their own, Healing Housing is often called upon to be a resident's, "family."
- While critical programming additions have shown a direct positive impact on our residents' healing and sobriety, postgraduation provides numerous challenges. The ongoing need alumnae have for affordable housing assistance, mental health support, and overall case management can become overwhelming for our small team.

'22 OBJECTIVES

SECURE NEXT-STEP GRADUATE HOUSING

 Develop housing partnerships that are safe, affordable, and allow women to be with their children.

• GROW ALUMNAE CARE PROGRAM

 Support graduates with a dedicated case manager and specialized fund for extended care.

• IMPLEMENT TRAINING

- Serve a wider population of women with multi-tiered Diversity, Equity & Inclusion (DEI) training for staff, residents and volunteers.
- Become a Trauma-Informed Community by providing knowledge and skills to better equip the program team and residents.

• DEVELOP STRATEGIC PLAN

 Create a 5-year plan with programming and housing goals, including the purchase of a housing structure to double the current HH residential occupancy.

CONTINUED FUNDING OF NEW PROGRAMS

- 9 weeks of initial services provided at no cost to new residents.
- Stipend for residents during vocational and career training with Uprise Nashville.
- Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner specialist as an on-going part of HH's program services.



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
